Devotional Thought for August

Søren Kierkegaard, the great 19th century Danish philosopher, referred to a parable of sorts, one he may even have authored, in which a fire breaks out backstage right before a circus troupe is set to perform. In a panic, the stage manager sends out one of the performers – a clown, who is already in costume – to warn the audience to leave immediately. But the spectators take the clown's desperate pleas as part of his *schtick*. The more the clown gestures and pleads the more the audience settles in and laughs, until fire engulfs the whole theater. And Kierkegaard's point?

Kierkegaard was a philosopher, but his passion was directed toward renewing Christian faith within Christendom. His remedy for a lethargic and largely irrelevant church was not to simply speak louder the same old religious words or to gesticulate with greater ferocity. That would be laughable and dangerous. For Kierkegaard, the remedy had more to do with the recovery of **passion**, carefully directed and intentionally sustained passion.

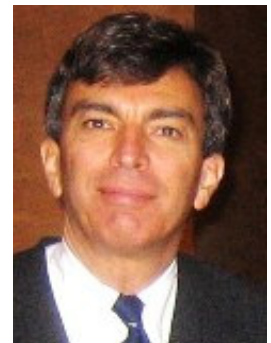
You may be thinking, why didn't the messenger (the clown) simply lead the audience to the exit doors and out of the theater? Good question. The loss of passion usually can be traced to a crisis in leadership. Why didn't the messenger simply remove his funny clothing so that his costume didn't add to the confusion? Good question. A crisis in strategic leadership is often supported by tactical blunders. Added together, people die.

So what? Well, yesterday I met with several United Methodist clergy colleagues on the Eastside, and it is becoming clear to me that I must reexamine what I am saying and doing. If I am simply entertaining the good people of St. Peter's, perhaps I need to revise my *schtick* and my material. Woe to the pastor who is a catalyst for lethargic and irrelevant discipleship. And leadership? Well, leadership must take place *within* and *from* those in the pews, in the midst of the larger crowd in need of directions. With adequate and passionate lay leadership, our movement into the church (for worship) and out of the church (for mission) will go like clockwork.

Let us pray that God will reveal to us how we can become better messengers *of* the good news of the gospel and more effective leaders whose passion *for* the gospel motivates our hearers to respond *to* the gospel. Long before Kierkegaard worried about the state of 19th century Danish Christianity, tradition suggests that wise old Solomon worried about the people of Israel and sounded this warning: **"Where there is no vision, the people perish."** Proverbs 29:18.

What's keeping us from stepping off the stage and really leading with passion? Let us lead each other **out of the church** so that we can lead our neighbors **into the church**. In other words, let's not clown around.

“Every human life is worth a biography...” A friend of mine recently began an entry in her Blog with these words. She was reflecting on the message given by a pastor at her mother’s funeral, who used the phrase, and she extended his thoughts to suggest that “ if we started to see our lives and the lives of our friends as more worthy of biography, we could also learn more about them while they’re with us, instead of waiting to hear about a small slice of their lives described at a funeral.”

As **Rosemary** and I become acquainted with our new neighbors, we hear many fascinating stories about their lives and how they came to live where we now are. As I have these conversations I realize that there are many at St. Peter’s whose “biographies” I really don’t know. That is not right. All of us should know each other well as we share our common commitment to serving Christ. So in future social gatherings and committee meetings, I need to do something about this and get to know people better. I hope others will do likewise.

Another challenge we face as we live our lives as church members is knowing how God intends for us to live together. **Charles Gutenson** has addressed this question in his new book, *Christians and the Common Good*. **Don Duncan** and I are considering conducting a multi-session, Sunday morning study series, using this book. It starts with a consideration of the nature of God and how God would have us treat one another and then asks how our engagement in public issues and institutions might flow from these principles.

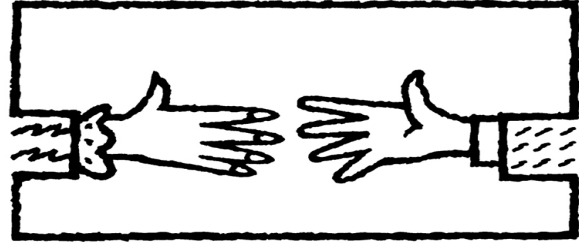

She's MADD for Camp!

Most of you know that I have made an annual trek over to the Rathdrum, Idaho area to dean the Music/Art/Drama/Dance Camp (a.k.a. MADD) at Twinlow Methodist Camp for some eleven years now. This year's camp was held July 2nd through 10th, and was once again full of activity for our middle-school through high school aged campers. We offered choir, orchestra, handbells, drama, dance, and clown ministries at this camp. My co-dean, **Bill Dugger** of Lewiston, Idaho, and I have been doing this together now for 10 years, with all the rest of the staff together with us at least 3 years or more now.

We set up for most all of our activities, except clowns and dance, in Selkirk, which is like a dormitory, complete with a large meeting room on both floors, and dorm-styled rooms down both adjacent halls. This building, which is the newest one at Twinlow, overlooks a large playing field with Twin Lakes below that. We have Morning Watch at the lake which our camp pastor, **Naomi Golter** from Rosalia, WA, is in charge of along with two of our camp guitarists providing music for praise-style singing. Evenings we also have another devotional time that is generally led by



campers, but held at various parts of the camp and often with other camps in attendance at Twinlow.

We have plenty of time mid-afternoon for Free Time when the campers may go swimming, boating, do activities in the Craft Cabin, nap, or visit. Planned activities in the evening along with choir/dance/drama include relay races, s'mores and campfire singing, a flashlight hike, improv activities, a talent show, and a movie.

Our camp culminates with participation of our campers at Spokane Valley United Methodist Church. This year we provided a choir, a clown ministry, a musical theater duet, and handbells performing/singing for both the 9:00 Traditional Service and the 11:00 Contemporary Service.

I do believe this particular camp is one of the "best kept secrets" in the Pacific Northwest Conference because there is so much to offer by such highly qualified staff. Yet, we have been under-enrolled for several years now. But, according to the new Twinlow management, that is about to change! I'll keep you posted on how things turn out next year!

Stewardship Message

The One-Dollar Bill

A torn and ragged one-dollar bill discovered that it was about to be retired from circulation. As it slowly moved along the conveyor belt to the shredder, it struck up a conversation with a fifty-dollar bill that was meeting the same fate.

The fifty began reminiscing about its travels all over the country. "Life has been good," the fifty exclaimed. "Why, I've been to Las Vegas, the finest restaurants in New York, political fund raisers, and just returned from a cruise on the Caribbean."

"Gee," said the one-dollar bill, "you're fortunate to have been able to visit all those places." "So where all have you been in your lifetime, my little friend," says the fifty? "Well, I've been to ... the Methodist Church, the Baptist Church, the Episcopal Church, the Presbyterian Church, the Lutheran Church, the Catholic Church, the Orthodox Church, the Assembly of God Church, the Brethren Church, the Quaker Church, the Pentecostal Church, the Charismatic Church, the Mennonite Church, the Church of Christ..."

"Excuse me," says the fifty, "but what's a church?"

Question: What is a "church"? Well, Jesus said that "where two or three are gathered in His name" He will be there. Some use this to define "church". That is well and good but when one has a facility, such as St. Peter's UMC, the "church" means more than a gathering of two or three. The church is a facility to provide spiritual sustenance to worshipers and from which we reach out to help others.

St. Peter's UMC has an annual budget of one-quarter million dollars (\$250,200)! This revenue is necessary to support the mission of St. Peter's. Where does St. Peter's get the quarter-million dollars in revenue to provide these services? From the members and supporters of St. Peter's! (All figures are rounded to the nearest \$100.)

The estimated income for the current year comes from a variety of sources:

- Pledges = \$178,800 or 71%
- Loose plate offerings = \$12,100 or 5%
- Special offerings = \$9,500 or 4%

Seventy-six percent of our annual revenue comes directly from the congregation in the form of pledges and offerings! We get significant revenue from outside sources as well:

- Child care = \$12,000 or 5%
- Building use by others = \$6,500 or 3%
- T-Mobile = \$12,200 or 5% (Restricted to physical improvements)

Our endowment funds provide us with a dividend that constitutes part of our revenue: Dividend from our Endowment Funds is \$17,700 or 7%. These revenues are almost 100% of the anticipated income for the year. All other sources, Safeway Gift Cards, Country Store, etc., amount to less than 1% of the revenues.

From the above, one can see that the most significant source of revenue is the congregation; 80% consisting of pledges, loose plate offerings and special offerings. Of these sources, pledges make up the lions share, 71%, and pledges are the most likely source that can be expanded by increased personal giving and increased participation.

Next month we will examine where the money goes.

Last year the kids in VBS did a fantastic job of collecting school supplies to be distributed to Bellevue School District kids who are unable to purchase their own. A little extra help may be needed this year as the number of requests has increased.

A list of needed supplies is posted on the bulletin board in the hallway near the Fellowship Hall. School supplies may be left in the church office any day between July 24th and August 7th. Gift cards for Target or Fred Meyer or checks to buy backpacks or missing supplies may be left with **Sue Wiseman** in the office weekday mornings or put in the offering plate. Checks should be written to St. Peter's, clearly marked "Back to School" or made out directly to Congregations for Kids/EISCC.

Take advantage of all the back to school sales! New this year to the supply list is a request for USB 2 GB Memory Stick/Thumb Drive/Flash Drive...it's a sign of the times!

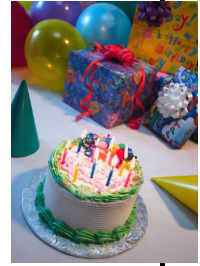

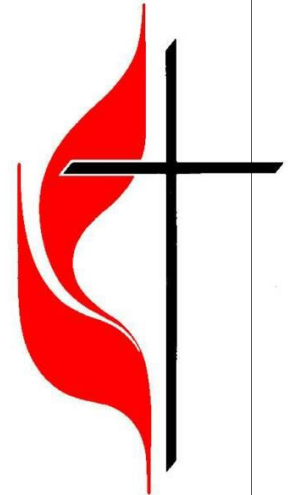
