The month of January is one of my favorite months because of its prominence and origins; it is a month with rich and suggestive relevance. According to Roman mythology, Janus was thought to be the god of gates and doors, of beginnings and endings. The name January, given to the first month in our calendar, refers back to the ancient custodian of our annual intrigue and desire into looking backward *and* looking forward.



In the Vatican collection there stands a marvelous rendering of Janus, which is one of my favorite images of a reality that escapes easy description. This double-headed figure reveals our desire to look in more than one direction, a longing to transition *from* and, at the same time, *into* a new time, condition, or age. Welcome to January – the month for saying “goodbye” to a year that has ended, the month for saying “hello” to the new year that is underway.

For me, however, the more relevant figure for January is Simeon (referred to as the Righteous, the Elder, the God-Receiver, or Holy Simeon). Unlike Janus, a mythological figure, Simeon is remembered as a devout man of

Jerusalem who was “looking forward to the consolation of Israel; and the Holy Spirit rested upon him.” (Luke 2:25) In this painting, Alexey Yegorov (1835) has Simeon looking down at the baby, but we know that he is aware of much more than what meets his eyes. St. Luke indicates that he was aware of the Spirit and the ancient longing of Israel’s hope, and Simeon’s own words seem to predict the violent end to the life of Jesus of Nazareth (“this child is destined for the falling and rising of many in Israel... and,” speaking of Mary, “a sword will pierce your own soul too”).



The gospel reading for the first Sunday in 2012 is Luke 2:22-40 in which Simeon takes baby Jesus into his arms and utters a prayer. It is known as *Nunc dimittis* (Latin for “now dismiss”). At verse 29 we read: “Lord, now you let your servant go in peace; your word has been fulfilled. My eyes have seen the salvation you have prepared in the sight of every people, a light to reveal you to the nations and the glory of your people, Israel.”

For Simeon, his words may reflect that he was ready to die, having seen that for which he had longed. But for us the prayer can serve as an assignment to tell the story that a Light has come to the nations and that glory will follow. May the light and glory of a New Year bless you and motivate us all to tell and retell the story of the Christ.

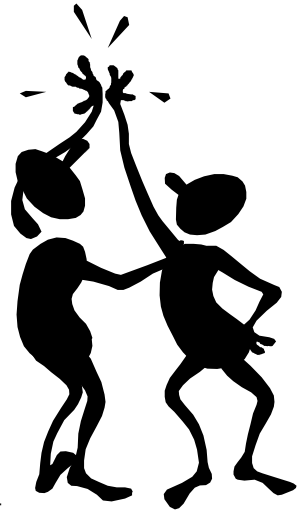
Report from the Finance Committee

We would like to express our thanks to the congregation for completely funding your 2011 pledges. Your faithfulness in completing your pledge helped us to meet the 2011 budget, with a small balance to end the year.

Although the final numbers for the just completed Stewardship and Financial campaign are not available, we have over \$190,000 in pledges for 2012. There were 5+ fewer pledging units, but an increase of over \$14,000 in giving. Thus, we are able to give our staff a much deserved raise, fund our bell choir director, choir director and accompanist, and continue to support the programs, administration and property of St. Peter's. As Temperatures Drop, Shelter Guests Increase

Up to about 40 homeless men each night have been sleeping in our Fellowship Hall since the Eastside Winter Shelter opened on November 22nd. The men are grateful for this refuge from the cold nights and the shelter has fit into the usual workings of the church with only a few problems.

As issues have arisen, shelter director, **David Johns-Bowling**, has been quick to follow up and resolve the issue. Thanks also to several members of the Trustees who have quickly attended to repairs or other issues. These include: **Rich Rucker**, **Jack Hart** and **Shirley Lumry** as well as our resident repairman, **Ed Peterson**. Others such as **Diana Wilson** and **Karen Armstead**, having received a report that the men were using paper towels to wash up, are putting together a laundry service so that the men can have proper washcloths and towels. Please call Diana (425-641-3297) or Karen (425-444-2918) if you can contribute serviceable used hand towels or washcloths or if you can volunteer to launder the towels and washcloths.

The shelter will be at our church until March. If you see something not quite right as a result of having the shelter in our church, please contact one of the members of the Liaison Team: **Rev. Tom Steffen**, **Pat King**, **Shirley Lumry**, **Jason Robarts**, **Sherry Magnuson**, **Dick Clark** or **Terry Patrick**.

Anyone wanting to donate blankets, disposable dinnerware, disinfectant wipes, flashlights & batteries, bottled water or food such as cereal, protein bars, canned tuna or crackers is welcome to, but we ask that you contact **Barbara Woontner** at 425-417-4815 or wintershelter@SophiaWay.org before bringing items to the church, as EWS has special areas to house supplies.

As an added note to this article by Pat, I received a phone call last week from a woman who lives in the neighborhood and attends a church in Issaquah. Her son offered a young man a ride to the shelter late one night. The man said his mother had recently died of cancer. He had no place to live, but was looking forward to his brother's discharge from the army because they would be able to be together. The woman was very concerned regarding the young man's situation and told me, "I've driven past your church for years, and I never knew you were involved in the community." I went on to tell her about our outreach to Sophia Way and Friends of Youth in addition to providing meals at the Salvation Army and Seattle 1st UMC. She asked how she could help EWS, and I gave her Barbara's and Andrea's numbers. Comments I've heard from our surrounding community have been those of encouragement and gratitude. ~ Sue

Youth from 3 to 22, guided by **Jennifer** and **Scott**, have served us food and provided inspiration during a special worship service.

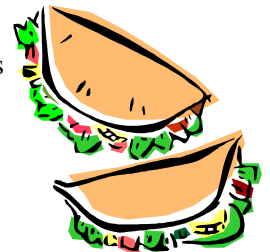

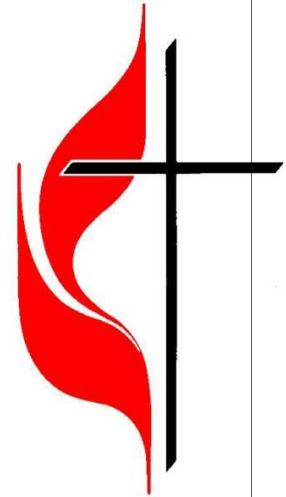
